THE CEO & CHAIR





Relying predominantly on face-to-face fundraising and family events, the COVID pandemic has had a dramatic effect on Brainwave Australia's support of families and income this year and the resultant unfortunate need to reduce the hours and positions in our team.

During these uncertain times, all organisations must go back to their belief and purpose to reposition and achieve the best impact they can. Brainwave is no exception and we used the opportunity to replan with our Strategic Plan 2021-2024, which affirmed Brainwave's core belief that:

Informed, resilient and connected families reduce the impact of paediatric neurological conditions on children and their families.

Despite the challenges of the COVID restrictions, we continued to expand our hospital-based initiatives, enabling us to reach more families, through the growth of our Catch-A-Break program and Bear Essentials Packs to all the major paediatric hospitals across Australia.

As a result, we were able to connect with more families who suddenly found themselves in a hospital to provide immediate support, including emergency accommodation.

Thanks to the terrific support from donors, trusts and foundations, we were also able to continue our commitment to providing support for the transition from hospital to home during the year by funding mobility equipment, aids, and therapies that assist recovery and rehabilitation.

Connecting parents to peer support is core to Brainwave's role and we have been delighted to see the increased engagement and sharing through the Brainwave Parents Connect facebook page.

Throughout this challenging year, the support from our corporate partners – our Principal Partner, Mercedes Benz, along with Ferrero, Smartways, BluePrint, OMD, Pinchapoo and Madame Flavour has been outstanding through ongoing financial and expert contributions that have enabled Brainwave to continue its work.

With Amy Timoshanko's departure in July 2021 to Girl Guides Victoria, we welcomed the highly experienced not-for-profit leader, Paul Bird, who has already made a big impression.

We also welcomed Melissa Webster, Executive Director Clinical Services of Irabina Autism Services, and Kenny Stewart, Group Managing Director of OMD, to the Board.

With ten children being diagnosed with brain injuries and illnesses a day in Australia, over 3,000 families a year are plunged into crisis and a very different future.

The needs of the child mean that families typically enter financial hardship by losing an income earner, struggle to navigate service systems, lack trusted information and advice, face social isolation, exhaustion, and guilt over the neglect of siblings.

"You feel guilty - like you are favouring one over another - but you can't do it all."

A third of families split up under the pressure of caring for a child with complex medical needs. The ways that children and families with brain injury and illness adapt and respond are incredible. But many families still lack access to the information, resources and connections they need.

We believe that this support – information, resources and connections – is essential in helping families to thrive and adapt.

EQUIPMENT & THERAPIES PROGRAM PROGRAM

This valuable program assists Brainwave children with their recovery by providing specialist equipment and access to allied health therapies.

In 2020/21 we provided funding for a variety of equipment and therapy applications. We are proud to have supplied a range of essential equipment to our Brainwave children, including:

- A mobile feeding device
- A lateral stability suit
- Specialised tricycles
- Bath seats/bench
- Head support collars
- Walking frames A car harness system
- A standing frame
- An air pressure mattress



CATCH-A-BREAK

Families often experience significant financial strain when faced with unexpected, ongoing costs associated with a child's long term hospital stay.

Brainwave works in consultation with hospital social workers to ensure that disadvantaged families have access to urgent financial support.

In 2020/21 Brainwave provided assistance with emergency accommodation for families traveling outside of metropolitan areas. Meal and beverage vouchers were also distributed to those in need, enabling families to 'Catch-A-Break'.



BRAINWAVE CHRISTMAS PARTIES

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



MEET EMILY

Emily is our first child. At week 19 of the pregnancy, the ultrasound detected that Emily had suffered a right sided haemorrhage. She was born via C-section at 37 weeks weighing 2.3kg. An MRI at 8 weeks showed a right sided basal ganglia embolic stroke.

Emily is a 5-year-old girl with a diagnosis of spastic quadriplegic cerebral palsy (effecting all 4 limbs) with a gross motor classification scale level III and FMS 4,2,1.

Emily is significantly affected by her spasticity with a high level of spasticity of the left upper and lower limbs, moderate to right lower limb and mild to right upper limb. She also has microcephaly. She has also developed seizures caused by the damage to her brain

Emily has significant tone and spasticity in her limbs, left more than right. She has moderate to significant tightness in her hamstrings and gastroc muscles which requires careful monitoring and management. She has AFOs and leg wraps to assist with this as well as the use of a standing frame. Emily is under the care of the VPRS team at RCH and requires a set of botox every year. Emily also has significant tightness in her left upper limb which is being managed by her occupational therapist.

She has been receiving different types of therapy since she was 8 months young. This includes physiotherapy, Occupational therapy, Speech therapy and music therapy. She requires ongoing, regular physiotherapy input to maximise her outcomes, monitor for tightness and secondary issues and progress her skills.

In late 2018, Emily had accessed funding through the Better Start program however due to the delayed roll out of the NDIS, these funds were exhausted and Emily had not had funding to access the therapy she required. Brainwave had played major role in helping to support Emily's therapy while we were waiting for NDIS to roll in. Brainwave's generosity had enabled Emily to continue receiving Physiotherapy and Occupational therapy and improving her balance movement.

We are now fully funded by NDIS.

Her progress in the last 12 months including independent steps, using her left hand (weak hand) to stabilise objects, ability to say up to 15 words, ability to pick up object from the floor, ability to play throw and catch balls.

She uses walker at school but walks by her self around the house.


Emily is a determined, always smiling at people, and she is fearless with a impulsive nature. She will try her best and have a go at everything in school.

We are proud of her and believe she will achieve more in the future.

Every day in Australia, as many as ten children are diagnosed with a neurological condition such as cerebral palsy, epilepsy, stroke, or brain tumour.




Brainwave Australia, like all charities, has experienced another challenging year due to the continuing restrictions because of the COVID-19 pandemic. This has significantly impacted the organisations' ability to hold fundraising events as well as provide family support events to our Brainwave families.

Commonwealth Government assistance (mainly Job Keeper), together with generous support from our

supporters, enabled Brainwave to continue to deliver direct funding to families, however at a much lower than pre-COVID-19 levels.

Each year, Brainwave prepares a full set of accounts which are independently audited by BDO, located at Level 18, 727 Collins Street, Melbourne, Victoria and lodged with the Australian Securities and Investments Commission. Our statutory accounts are available on request.
